Subject Specific Arts Integration

Instituting a Visual Arts Liaison in your District

This presentation/documentary covered the evolution of how the Visual Arts Liaison (VAL) position was developed and the results of embracing multiple perspectives for problem-based learning in our own district.

Subject Specific

A project-based unit whereby a specific product outcome is the subject of relevance. Students are provided materials and instruction by the VAL to create their own replica, interpretive model, or stylist example of what they have been shown.

Subject Enhancers

A project-based unit whereby one teacher's subject area is explored with the assistance of a VAL. The unit design features are created by the VAL specifically to enhance the primary teacher's unit with an overlay of studio habits, art, and design principles.



A project-based unit whereby a specific topic is selected by the VAL. Students then assist in developing relevant subject areas to include in the framework of the selected topic. This strategy naturally cultivates personalized interest by allowing for indepth and specific research on one topic while at the same time intuitively inspires collaboration.

Thematic Blend

A project-based unit created by one or more teachers and a VAL. Curriculum outcomes are blended so significantly that the discipline areas answer meaningful questions to problems explored and examined in the complementary discipline.

Take Away

Our collaborative pilot projects demonstrated to us and our team teachers that students are engaged when they are presented with concepts and skills that integrate disciplines. The four Bridging Strategies are a template that has been created to enhance curriculum for the Visual Arts and Design Teacher. The objective for VALs is to take a leadership role in modeling and collaborating on interdisciplinary or transdisciplinary learning. The Bridging Strategies provide increasingly challenging levels of higher order thinking and requires flexibility for greater adaptability when in practice. Our goal is that the changing world will go beyond discipline based teaching while remaining unified by a topic or idea of inquiry.

There has been quite a flurry of activity in the World Language Department recently with guest speakers, authentic food samplings, participation in an oratory contest, and international trips being planned for the coming month! Read on to find out more about all of the exciting local and global happenings and events!

Back in January, three Ipswich High School alumnae of the French program returned to speak to a class of freshmen French students about their collegiate studies, their high school language learning experiences, and their future plans for further language study and travel in upcoming semesters. **Amelia Young, Lilly Kallman, and Olivia Kubaska** who attend Emerson, Barnard, and Dickinson Colleges respectively, shared their insight



with ninth grade students just before heading back to campus for their second semester at college. All three attested to the value of studying and learning a language at IHS and offered many tips to these younger students about how to profit from their academic experiences throughout high school. Two out of three of these recent graduates are continuing with their French studies at the university level while combining the Romance Language with courses in English, Economics, and Environmental Studies. Although their former classmate is not studying French currently she believes that the French she has learned over the years will helpher with her dream of producing films, perhaps even attending the Cannes Film Festival one day!

French III students will be receiving guests from various parts of the Francophone world as well beginning next week. Salimata Ounkara, a senior at UMASS Boston, will be presenting a lesson on Gabon and plans to teach students a bit of Obamba which is a native language of this country. Later in the month engineer Arnoux Nicolas will be returning to IHS to teach students about Haiti and Haitian Creole while we are hopeful that Yasmine Soltani, who works at Education First in Cambridge, will be able to joinus for a Lebanese-Arabic seminar in early April. Finally, IHS seniors Nick and Marie Hawwa are organizing a lesson about their native country of Lebanon and plan to share their first-hand knowledge of Lebanese and Arabic with junior French students! What better way to learn about places where French and other languages are spoken than through the eyes and experiences of people so closely connected to these diverse regions of the world!

Speaking of different parts of the globe, a number of IHS students will be boarding airplanes this spring to travel to France and Costa Rica during the week of April vacation! French teacher Al Craven and parent Kitty Bartholomew have worked tirelessly over the past several months to organize the other half of an exchange visit to Hyères in the south of France and because of their formidable efforts, eighteen of our French students will be reconnecting with their host students and families very soon! These students will be spending the Easter holiday in French homes and after have a number of adventures planned including trips to Toulon and Maseilles as well as hikes and tours around this picturesque area with endless vistas of the Mediterranean Sea.

Spanish teacher Nicole Marotta has worked closely with the school-based tour company Explorica and has quite a trip planned as well for this same week. She along with eleven students and fellow language teacher Susan Killian will be going to Costa Rica where visits to the Poás Volcano, Lake Arenal, Monteverde, Puntarenas and even a local school await this group! Students and chaperones are sure to get an up close perspective on the concept of *Pura Vida* through activities such as kayaking, horseback rid-

ing, surfing, canopy tours and other cultural experiences in this lush and beautiful country. We are extremely thankful to Miss Marotta for initiating, promoting and organizing this amazing opportunity for our students to immerse themselves in this part of the Spanish-speaking world!

A bit closer to home, Spanish II students have enjoyed some cultural events of their own making lately as they prepared a number of authentic and traditional Spanish dishes to sample during class over the past few weeks. As a culminating project for their food unit, students researched recipes common in Spanish speaking countries and worked in small groups to prepare a number of dishes including Paella, Churros, Croquetas, Patatas Bravas, Magdelenas, Tres Leches Cake, Pan Rustico, and even Guacamole with homemade chips! Students made videos and/or poster displays in which they described how to prepare the various recipes and then feasted on the delicious spread, enjoying the different flavors and novel foods enormously while completing comment cards and sharing their gastronomical opinions with one another!



Finally, the entire World Language Department extends hearty congratulations to Nina Gillette for receiving first place in the annual Club Richelieu Concours Oratoire on March 6th! Held at the Hawthorne Hotel in Salem, this oratory contest is sponsored



by a long-standing group of French speakers who gather monthly to discuss any number of topics related to the French language, culture, and society. Contestants are required to deliver a presentation in fluid and accurate French on a given topic, this year relating a particular work of art or literature to the time period in which it was created or written. A junior French IV student, Nina selected a contemporary piece entitled *Kiffe-Kiffe Demain* by Faïza Guène and spoke about a number of present day issues in France as well as those that are more universal in nature, common even to us here in the United States. Nina will again present her work in her highly eloquent, polished, assured, and engaging manner as she moves on to the regional round of this contest on Saturday, March 18th.
