

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French Exchange Students Immerse Themselves in Ipswich

On Oct 20th, nineteen students from France arrived to immerse themselves in a true American high school experience at IHS. Language Department Head Susan Killian shared a description of their visit, excerpted here: "These students, accompanied by their teachers..., attend the Lycée Costebelle in Hyères, France which is located near Toulon and Provence, in the southeastern part of the country. Like Ipswich, it is a seaside community, however with a view of the Mediterranean Sea as opposed to the Atlantic Ocean and a landscape dotted with palm trees rather than the classic New England oaks, maples or pines. This is the same school where Ipswich High School French teacher Al Craven worked as an assistant teacher for a couple of years, hence the connection between these two somewhat similar yet distant parts of the world."

"During their eleven day stay, students and their teachers attended school daily, going to classes with their host students, visiting and assisting with ... French classes..." The group and their hosts attended IHS sporting events, toured iconic Ipswich locations and Boston. Their experience culminated in a two day visit to the Crane Estate for a tour of the Great House, a grand potluck dinner in the Casino, croquet on the lawn, bobbing for apples, and a stroll near the dunes on the beach.

Robotics Team Participates in Real World Whale Research, Featured on Boston News

Students from the Ipswich TIGERS FIRST Robotics Team 5459 were featured in Paula Ebben's segment "Eye on Education" broadcast Tuesday during the WBZ-TV Ch 4 News. This summer, several of the team members participated with Gloucester-based Ocean Alliance to engineer an altitude measuring device that attaches to a drone affectionately called SnotBot. SnotBot flies above breaching whales to collect samples of fluids emanating from their blow-holes (whale snot). DNA and hormones are present in these samples, which are collected with this non-invasive technique, furthering scientific studies with minimal effect on the subject whale. This cooperation between a local company and the high school robotics team is a perfect example of project-based learning, where students are given a general task, research possible alternatives, and develop a solution.
