Message from School Committee Chair, Barry W. Hopping

Hard to believe that we're already well into the month of February and in the midst of the annual operating budget development season again. Dr. Blake and members of our Leadership Team have worked diligently to prepare and present a budget that provides for the needs of all students in the Ipswich Public Schools. Future presentations and public hearings await in the weeks ahead, but we remain ever confident that our requests are justifiable and essential for the intellectual growth and development of our children along with ensuring for their continued social/emotional health and well-being. We invite and encourage you to attend the Public Hearing on the budget at our next meeting scheduled for Thursday, February 27. To this point, we have simply taken the Leadership Team's proposals "under advisement." At the close of the Public Hearing in two weeks, the School Committee will vote to accept the final budget which will then become publicly available, posted on the district website, and go forward to the Finance Committee for their consideration during presentations on March 10 & 12. You are urged to attend those meetings as well in support of our schools.

As we continue to explore different ways to enhance communication between the School Committee and residents of the town, we've encountered some obstacles that have hindered our efforts. First, I want to thank you for your patience as we've been forced to endure countless delays in our attempts to provide live broadcasts of our bi-weekly meetings. The issue has been with the "Tricaster," which is the central piece of the broadcast system. It functions as the brains behind the switcher (camera control), recording server, and signal distributor for the entire system. It broke several weeks ago and had to be sent out to the one place in the country that repairs these units, located in San Antonio, Texas. They had the system for five weeks trying to figure out why the power supply had died, but could not come up with a solution. As a result, we were left with a "faulty part." The problem was that as a computer, it would NOT boot up. Finally, the diagnosis was that the power supply to the computer had died. Today, I am very pleased to inform you that we're back in business. The part has been repaired, returned to us, reinstalled, and we'll be broadcasting live again on February 27.

Next, our sincere gratitude to those of you that have reached out to us over the past several months in reaction to a variety of school-related issues. It's always helpful for us to know what's on your mind and what challenges continue to nag at your impressions of us as a school district. Some of you have also voiced your frustration that no one other than the Chair responds to your emails. Please know that we all take your concerns and questions very seriously, but in an effort to prevent conflicting viewpoints or possible mixed messages, our practice has been and will continue to be that all correspondence channels back through the Chair. We want to ensure that our message is consistent and eliminates any doubt or confusion in regard to content or interpretation. We thank you for your understanding.

Building the Budget: A Summary of State and Federal Funding Sources

This is a busy time in both the Town Hall and in our School's Central Office. Budget season is in full swing, and our Town leaders and committees are hard at work to determine how to best fund the needs of the Town and Schools. We're all well aware that the majority of our core services and school expenses are funded by our real estate taxes. We wanted to take some space in this Newsletter to highlight some of the other funding sources that comprise an important part of our school budget.

Chapter 70 Program

These funds represent the State's contribution to each school district's public education budget. Massachusetts General Law assures "fair and adequate minimum per student funding for public schools in the commonwealth by defining a foundation budget and a standard of local funding effort applicable to every city and town in the commonwealth." To accomplish this, the state uses a complex formula based on factors such as property values, income, demographics, and student enrollment to establish (1) each municipality's minimum spending requirements, or the "Foundation Budget", and (2) the minimum requirements for each municipality's share of school costs, which are funded by local property taxes. Chapter 70 funds then close the gap by providing state aid for the remaining amount. Towns with a higher percentage of low income residents and low property values benefit the most from Chapter 70 funds.

Circuit Breaker Funds

Special Education costs continue to represent a significant, and growing, portion of every city and town's school budget. Special Education funding draws from four major sources: the general funds of the town, federal IDEA special education grants, Chapter 70 funds, and the Massachusetts Circuit Breaker program, which the Commonwealth put into effect in 2004 to help defray the expense to local school districts. Districts are eligible to be reimbursed by the state for a portion of their prior fiscal year's expenses attributed to legally mandated special education costs. The threshold for eligibility is tied to four times the state average foundation budget per pupil (as calculated by Chapter 70); Massachusetts is required to pay up to 75 percent of the costs over that threshold.

Title 1 Funding

Title 1 is a Federal program that provides financial assistance to districts and schools with high numbers or high percentages of children from low-income families to help ensure that all children meet challenging state academic standards. The majority of Title 1 funding in the US is allocated to 1st-6th grades. As with Chapter 70 funds, school districts with a larger percentage of students determined to be "at risk" receive the majority of the funds.

The priorities of Title I Funding are to:

- 1. Strengthen the core program in schools and provide academic and/or support services to low-achieving students at the preschool, elementary, middle, and high school levels;
- 2. Provide evidence-based programs that enable participating students to achieve the learning standards of the state curriculum frameworks;
- 3. Elevate the quality of instruction by providing eligible staff with substantial opportunities for professional development; and,
- 4. Involve parents/guardians of participating public and private school children as active partners in their children's education at school through open, meaningful communication, training, and, as appropriate, inclusion in decision-making processes.

Other outside funds

Our school budget is also bolstered in part by smaller sources of revenue. Fees charged for things like bus passes, sports user fees and Tiger Tots tuition help pay to fund those budget line items. School Choice and Special Education fees paid to us by school districts from which students transfer also help the bottom line and offset some costs

Fully funding a "right sized" school budget is always a challenge. Fixed costs increase at a rate faster than revenue can keep up. Each year, Ipswich and other similar school districts see our share of State and Federal grants decrease. The task of educating our students falls more than ever on the local taxpayers. As a School Committee, we will continue to push our legislators to find an answer to the decreased State and Federal funding in order help lessen the burden. Please feel free to reach out and let us know if you have any questions about the budget. It is important to us as a committee that everyone understands how the funds allocated to our schools are being spent.

School Committee Meet & Greet with the Ipswich Rotary Club



School Committee Subcommittees, Working Groups, and Liaisons

Beyond our twice-monthly Open Session meetings, each School Committee member serves on several subcommittees and working groups. This work is vital when considering budget, policy, and other issues facing the district. These small groups of School Committee members are assigned annually, typically meet at least monthly, and are responsible for providing the Committee information necessary to take action on school related matters.

Liaison positions, which are assigned each year just like subcommittees and working groups, afford School Committee representatives the opportunity to participate in other community meetings with relevance to Ipswich Public Schools. Our subcommittees, working groups, and liaisons give reports to the rest of the School Committee during our Open Session meetings.

STEAM Team: The Ipswich STEAM Team is comprised of Ipswich Public Schools teachers, high school student representatives, business and community members, and one School Committee member.
